
What is a Community Group?

Community groups are an essential expression of the mission of Living Hope Baptist Church. They're a place where we learn more about Jesus and life together. They're the place where we wrestle with the truths of the Bible and encourage one another toward the life that God intends for us.

Each community group is unique, shaped by its neighborhood and the people who attend. However, you can expect a weekly gathering in a residence that involves food, conversation, prayer, discussion for applying the Bible to practical living, and service in the neighborhood. At the heart of each community group is the desire to see an authentic community marked by love for Jesus, one another, and the neighborhood.

Why Should I Join a Community Group?

The God of the Bible is a Trinitarian God who is one and three persons: Father, Son, and Spirit. God has made us in his image, which means we are made for community and friendship. And when we are not living in community we suffer because life in a sinful world is too complex and tempting to journey alone. Therefore, community groups are a place where we can live in relationship with one another through the ups and downs of life.

The Gospel of Mark

Following Jesus on the Path of the Cross

INTRODUCTION

Mark begins his fast paced gospel account, bypassing Jesus birth and childhood, and going immediately to the testimonies that prove that this Jesus is truly the long awaited Messiah. Jesus is The Messiah that is the Good News, the Messiah that changes lives, the Messiah who is the authoritative One, the Messiah that is sent by the Father, and the Messiah who demands authority over the lives of those who follow Him. Mark's gospel informs his readers that following Jesus will include something that the crowds and even His close disciples will struggle with, and what is rarely talked about even today – following Jesus on the path to the cross. We will see that instead of running to Him and embracing Him, they concluded that this was not the Messiah they wanted at all, and they killed Him. Mark's gospel presents Jesus as the One who has the right to have authority over our lives and the one who follows Jesus must follow Him, even if it takes him to a "cross".

lesson one

This Jesus is the Good News



Mark 1:1-15

SUMMARY

It is a desperate time in the world and a desperate time among God's chosen people. Sin had caused a continual decline away from following God and it has been 400 years since a prophet of God had spoken. The people are in a seemingly hopeless situation and most did not even know it. Wickedness, rebellion, self-righteousness, and a religion of outward show with inward hypocrisy ruled in the land. Mark begins his fast paced Gospel by introducing his readers to the only One who could bring real change and hope to their hearts. That person is the promised Messiah. Mark gives us three testimonials as to the validity of this person's claim to be the promised Messiah. We will see that this person alone has the authority to defeat the devil and conquer sin and that this person alone is the Good News.

QUESTIONS

1. Read **Luke 1:17**. What does the prophecy about John's future ministry tell you about the culture of the people at this time?

2. Read Luke 1:15. What do you see in this verse that gives us insight into the power behind John's life and ministry?

3. In Mark 1:2, who sends the messenger?
4. In Mark 1:2,3, what is the purpose for sending the messenger?
5. Read Luke 1:19 . What did the angel Gabriel call the promise of John's birth? Why would he call his birth by this description?
6. As you read Mark 1:4, what makes this baptism different than all the other baptisms that took place in this culture? (See also the end of verse 5)
7. What attitude do you see from John as he compares himself with Jesus in verse 7?
8. What limitation of his ministry did John understand as seen in verse 8?

9. What two things occurred after Jesus was baptized by John? Mark 1:10,11
10. What can we see concerning the authority of Jesus in Mark 1:13?
11. What was Jesus' message in Mark 1:14,15?
APPLICATION 1. You will note that the wilderness is used in these first verses various times. We learned that Israel is said to be in a wilderness situation due to their sin (Is. 64:10). John is in the wilderness, and Jesus is led to the wilderness by the Spirit. Why is "wilderness" a good description when sin is dominating a life?
2. Are you in a "wilderness" situation now needing Christ or even as a believer who is struggling?

3. Jesus showed His authority over Satan and preached the Good News which was about Him. Where is your heart as you look at the wilderness of sin around you and the ability of Jesus to change hearts and defeat the devil? Think about those you are praying for and are burdened about.

lesson two

Jesus Authority to Call and to Change



Mark 1:16-20

SUMMARY

Jesus had been preaching for about a year and his followers had been with them up to this point. Mark takes us right to their formal calling to permanent discipleship as Jesus approaches them as they mended their nets on the Sea of Galilee. Today's passage focuses on four men that Jesus called but the emphasis is on the authority of Jesus to call and change those who are called. Jesus commands them to leave their former lives and to follow Him. These men obey Jesus and leave their business and their families to walk the same road as their Master Jesus. Jesus begins His ministry of changing them from fishing for fish to fishing for men.

QUESTIONS

Luke gives us much more detail surrounding the call of these men to discipleship. Turn to **Luke 5** and answer the following questions.

- **1.** How many people are said to be here as Jesus comes to the sea of Galilee? (verse 1)
- 2. What was Jesus doing? (verse 3)
- 3. What did Jesus ask Peter to do? (verse 4)
- **4.** What is Peter's verbal response and what is his heart response? **(verse 5)**

5. What is Peter's response to Jesus after the great catch of fish? (verse 17,8)
6. What did Jesus tell them that they would be doing from now on? (verse 10)
7. What two things did these men do? (verse 11)
APPLICATION 1. Jesus promises to make these men fishers of men if they will follow Him.
What is the significance of the order that Jesus gave in verse 17 ? (follow then become fishers of people)
What does it mean to "follow Jesus"?
How do you think Jesus makes you into a "fisher of people"?

2. Why do you think Mark emphasized the fact that they left their nets and then followed Jesus?
What things do people refuse to leave which prevents them from following Jesus?
Is there anything in your life that is a struggle to leave?
3. What do you think it means that to follow Jesus is to truly lose your life – that your life is over?

lesson three

The Authority of the Teaching of Jesus



Mark 1:21-28

SUMMARY

Jesus enters the synagogue to teach which causes a response from a demon and from those in attendance. The demon is terrified at the presence and teaching of the Son of God while the listeners recognize that his teaching is full of authority and power. They contrast His teaching with that of the Scribes. However, we are not told that those in attendance that day responded in repentance and followed Jesus. At this point we are told that the fame of Jesus is now spreading throughout the region of Galilee.

QUESTIONS

1. List the main characters in Mark 1:21-28.

2. What was Jesus doing that caused all there to react the way they did?

3. In **verse 23** we are told the demon "cried out". This word means to cry out loudly in a passionate and excited way usually having shrieks and screams with it. As you read **verse 24**, why do you think the demon reacted in this way? What does that tell you about how demons viewed Jesus?

4. In Luke's account in Luke 4:35, what does it seem the demon tried to

do to the man but was not allowed to do?

5. If this man who was inhabited by an unclean spirit was like this for some time and his practice was to come to the synagogue weekly, how come the teaching of the Scribes never moved him in the same way as the teaching of Jesus?
APPLICATION 1. In what practical ways can we obey the first part of Colossians 3:16? Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly
2. If you are not moved by the Word of God to repentance, obedience, thankfulness, awe, or worship; what might be your problem?

Lesson Three: The Authority of the Teaching of Jesus

3. Take the remainder of your time together discussing ways to be more prepared to receive the Word of God with the power and authority of Jesus when the church gathers and songs are sung about Jesus and His Word is proclaimed.

lesson four

The Authority and Compassion of Jesus



Mark 1:28-34

SUMMARY

Jesus leaves the synagogue and enters into Simon's house where Simon's mother in law is sick. Jesus heals her and she immediately begins to serve. After the Sabbath was officially over, the whole town makes their way to Simon's house to see Jesus. Jesus shows his authority over physical sickness and also spiritual sickness and the dark evil kingdom of Satan by healing their infirmities and casting out demons who would keep them bound in darkness.

7. Read Mark 6:34 and also Luke 13:34. What about the heart of God do you see in these two verses?

Mark 1:35-39

SUMMARY

Jesus, after a long day of serving, rises early to fellowship with His Father in prayer, confirms His ministry and purpose to His disciples, and leaves to preach the Gospel to those who have not yet heard.

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1. How do you think the physical body of Jesus was feeling after a long day of service and then rising very early in the morning?

2. Why do you think Mark makes sure his readers know that Jesus got up very early while it was dark? Why didn't he just say, "Jesus went out to pray in the morning."?

3. Why do you think the disciples of Jesus were able to find Jesus when they were hunting for Him?

4. As you read the first thing they said to Jesus in verse 37 , what does that tell you the disciples were concerned about?
5. Why didn't Jesus share the same concern as the disciples?
6. As you read verse 38 , why does Jesus not race back to those who were looking for Him. Why does he seemingly ignore them?

lesson six

The Authority of Jesus to Cleanse and Forgive



Mark 1:40-2:12

SUMMARY

In this passage we will see the power and authority of Jesus to cleanse and forgive. Mark gives us two accounts of men coming to Jesus in a very bold way. However, one came with the wrong heart, and the other came with a right heart. They both were healed physically but only one received spiritual life and forgiveness of sin. Jesus incites anger in the hearts of the religious leaders as He declares His authority to forgive sins.

QUESTIONS

1. As you read the two accounts of the leper (1:40-45), and the man who was paralyzed (2:1-12), what similarities and differences do you see between these two accounts?

Jesus Came for the Worst of the Worst



Mark 2:13-17

SUMMARY

In Lesson Seven Jesus calls a tax collector to follow him. Tax collectors were viewed by the Jewish people as the worst of the worst of sinners. Jesus dines with tax collectors and sinners causing the religious leaders much grief. Jesus informs them that He came for sinners and not for people who see themselves as righteous in their own eyes.

QUESTIONS

- 1. As you read the account in Mark 2:13-17:
 - a. What main difference do you see between Jesus and the Pharisees?

b. What main difference do you see between the Pharisees and the tax collectors and sinners?

<u>APPLICATION</u>

1. How does the phrase, "and such were some of you", in 1 Corinthians 6:11 help you to avoid the same spirit the Pharisees had towards the tax collectors and sinners? (Be sure to read verses 9 and 10.)

2. According to Ephesians 2:1-5, who did believers (you) follow before they (you) experienced God's grace?
3. Have you ever experienced rejection and how did you feel as a result of that rejection?
4. What do you think was the main reason the Pharisees rejected the tax collectors and sinners? How can this easily bleed over into your heart? (See Luke 18:9)

lesson eight

The Authority of Jesus over False Religion



Mark 2:18-22

SUMMARY

In Lesson Eight the Pharisees and the disciples of John ask Jesus why His disciples are not fasting as they do. Jesus informs them that their old lifeless false religion must go for it is impossible to mix it with Jesus and truth.

QUESTIONS

lesson nine

The Danger of Hard Hearted Religion



Mark 2:23-3:6

SUMMARY

Jesus is challenged twice by the Pharisees concerning His and the disciples actions on the Sabbath. Jesus takes them to Scripture showing that mercy and compassion take precedence over ceremony and ritual and then shows them that very thing as he heals the man with a withered hand. The true issue here is who Jesus is. Jesus informs them that He is the Lord of the Sabbath, claiming to be God. His Word and His actions nullify any man-made tradition that the Pharisees held to which totally missed the true meaning of the Sabbath. These Pharisees revealed the hardness of their heart as they refused the truth that Jesus taught and immediately set out to plot how to kill Jesus.

Mark 3:7-19

SUMMARY

In today's lesson we will see an overview of the ministry of Jesus and we will see the ones He desired to be with Him to carry on His ministry after He will be gone. We will see that the ones He picked were not a part of the religious leadership in Israel and they were certainly not the "best" choice in the eyes of the religious leaders or the world. These truths should be a great encouragement to us as we see our weaknesses and struggles as compared to others but yet also see what God can do in us when we are "with Jesus".

QUESTIONS

1. Read 1 Corinthians 1:26-31

26 For consider your calling, brothers: not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. 27 But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; 28 God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, 29 so that no human being might boast in the presence of God. 30 And because of him you are in Christ Jesus, who became to us wisdom from God, righteousness and sanctification and redemption, 31 so that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."

lesson eleven

What Do You Say About Jesus?



Mark 3:20-35

SUMMARY

In this passage Mark gives us an account of what Jesus' family and the Scribes were saying about Jesus. His family said He was "mad" and the Scribes said He received His power from Satan. Jesus informs the Scribes that it is impossible that His power comes from Satan and if they persist in rejecting the Holy Spirit they will never have forgiveness. He also claims that He is stronger than Satan and will defeat him. When His family came to stop Him He did not stop serving but He informs all those there that being a part of His spiritual family is the most important relationship there is.

QUESTIONS

1. As you observe what Jesus' family thought of Him in this passage, saying that He was mad, or insane, would you say your devotion and sacrificial life for God's kingdom would cause anyone to say this about you? Meditate upon this and examine whether or not your life for Jesus is seen as average, normal, and acceptable, or as dedicated, disciplined, and sacrificial.

2. In Mark 3:35, Jesus informs His listeners how they can know if they truly are a part of His spiritual family. Does your life prove that you truly are a child of God?

lesson twelve

The Secret of Kingdom Growth Part 1



Mark 4:1-20

SUMMARY

At this point in the ministry of Jesus, he was teaching the people in parables. A parabolic teaching "brought heaven to earth and earth to heaven", but it also caused further hardening in the ears of those who rejected the Messiah and His words. This lesson will examine the parable of the "Sower and the Seed." It will examine the purpose of parables and the plan of God which grows His kingdom. In part one we will see those who are inside the kingdom and those who are outside the kingdom. We will also examine the "seed" which grows the kingdom. In our next study we will examine the different responses to the seed which grows the kingdom.

The disciples once again fail to grasp what Jesus is saying to them. Jesus rebukes them and clarifies what He is truly concerned about. The religious leaders possess a hardened heart of stone and unbelief while His disciples believe, but they are still trying to grasp just who this person Jesus truly is.

They are still growing in their understanding of just who the Son of God really is, and Jesus encouraged them to know that He is the Son of God even though He must face suffering and death. The Father gave His approval as His voice thundered down in full approval of His Son. This experience would shape their lives after Jesus rose from the dead and ascended back to the Father.

Jesus clearly emphasizes the great danger sin brings and warns His followers that self-sacrificing discipline is a must in order to defeat sin in their lives. Jesus also emphasizes what awaits those who allow sin to rule their lives. Jesus, of course, is the ultimate source of victory over sin, even when his followers fail. Jesus kept this passage perfectly for those who believe and follow Him.

The disciples get with Jesus and ask Him further questions as they realize the importance of this issue that the Pharisees brought up. God's original plan is that marriage is permanent. We today should always strive to be as the original was. For those who find themselves away from that original plan, there is still grace.

Entering the Kingdom Like a Child



Mark 10:13-16

SUMMARY

Parents are bringing their children to Jesus to be blessed and the disciples are rebuking them for doing so. Jesus is indignant with His disciples and commands the children to be brought to Him because "to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." Jesus is very emphatic as He informs His disciples that no one will enter the kingdom if they do not receive it as a child. Jesus took the children in His arms and blessed them. We will see four things from this passage:

- 1. We must recognize that Jesus is our children's greatest need.
- 2. We cannot fail to see ourselves as recipients of grace.
- 3. We must know that all need grace to enter the kingdom.
- 4. We must know that Jesus has the power to save.

OBSERVATION

1. What do you think is in the hearts of the parents as they are bringing their children to Jesus? (What are the parents thinking?) **See verse 13.**

2. Looking at the response of the disciples in **verse 13**, what things are they thinking?

3. As Jesus observed his disciples and what they were doing to the ones bringing the children, what was He thinking? (See verse 14)

4. How did Jesus show the disciples they were wrong in their thinking? (See verse 14)
5. What spiritual lesson concerning salvation and entrance into the kingdom did Jesus make? (See verse 14,15)
6. What did Jesus do to the children who were brought? (See verse 16)
APPLICATION 1. What a great example these parents were who brought their children to Jesus. What things in our culture are we tempted to see as more pressing and more important than bringing our children to Jesus?
2. In what ways can we today bring our children to Jesus?

3. Are there some ways that we can turn our children "away" from Jesus? List some of these ways.
4. How does remembering we are recipients of God's grace, help us to desire grace for others, no matter who they are and no matter what their sins are? (Don't forget how Jesus viewed this attitude)

What Do You Want Me to Do for You?



Mark 10:17-52

SUMMARY

Jesus encounters a young rich man who asks Him how to obtain eternal life. Jesus attempts to lead the man to see his inability to earn it and his failure to keep the commandments. Because of the young man's love for riches, he walks away from Jesus sad. Jesus uses this to teach His disciples an important lesson concerning salvation – Man's inability, and God's ability. Jesus teaches them that following Him is greater than anything the world could offer – even the persecution that is going to come. He offers Himself up as the supreme example of discipleship and closes with healing a blind man as an example of what the power of God can do over the inability of man.

Impressive Without, Empty Within



Mark 11

SUMMARY

Jesus has now entered the last week of his earthly life. Word is out that He is coming to Jerusalem and a crowd gathers to shout His praises as the Messiah. However, the desires of the people are not for a suffering Messiah, but rather for a conquering Messiah. Jesus, in this passage condemns a fruitless fig tree and a fruitless worship system in the Temple. He urges His followers to have faith in God that He is the sacrifice that brings forgiveness and changes lives and kills an empty and vain religious system.

4. How is forgiving others being like Jesus and how can it be considered a sacrifice? Do you find it hard to forgive others?

lesson thirty

The Battle of Authority



Mark 12

SUMMARY

The question of Jesus' authority has been an issue throughout our study of Mark. Jesus is the supreme authority and the religious rulers refuse to acknowledge that truth. In chapter 12 Jesus tells a parable that is aimed directly at these religious rulers and their rejection of the Father's plan and the authority of Jesus as God's Son. Following this parable the enemies of Jesus present Him with three questions in an attempt to trip Him up and discredit Him before the multitudes and even cause the civil authorities to rise up against Him. Jesus answers each challenge with great wisdom and then condemns them for their evil hearts and the evil religious system they have put in place. Jesus also reveals that this evil system will be destroyed and all those who reject His authority will be destroyed as well.

When Will These Things Be?



Mark 13

SUMMARY

After leaving the temple Jesus informs his disciples that the temple will be destroyed. Naturally, the disciples ask Jesus about when this is going to happen. Their question includes three parts: When will these things be, what will be the sign of your coming, and what will be the sign of the end of the age? Jesus answers their question by telling them there will be a delay before the end comes. This delay will involve many characteristics that will be true for all generations. In Jesus answer He gives the general characteristics and then some immediate characteristics concerning the fall of the Temple and of Jerusalem.

OBSERVATION

God's Redemption Using Evil



Mark 14

SUMMARY

Jesus is now in the last few days of his life before He is crucified. With the exception of Jesus' obedience and Mary's example of sacrifice in anointing Jesus for His death, there is nothing in this chapter but sin, evil, darkness, and the failure of man. Jesus is betrayed by one of his own and after bold statements from His followers that they would never deny him, they all ran away from Jesus. While this looks like a sure defeat at the hands of evil men instigated by their father the devil, God is actually using their evil to accomplish His plan of redemption for sinful man. Jesus, in spite of His sorrow, and in spite of His followers deserting Him, obediently follows His Father's plan for the salvation of His sheep.

SUMMARY

Jesus is facing the hatred of the religious leaders, the poor justice of Pilate, and the easily swayed crowds as they shout for His murder and call for a murderer to be freed. The agony and humiliation Jesus bore is beyond human comprehension. Perhaps the greatest pain of all was when He bore our sins and His Father turned His face away. Jesus goes to His death in full control and in full obedience to His Father. The work was truly finished in His death and in His anticipated resurrection. The veil in the temple was torn from top to bottom signifying that entrance to God was only found in the person and work of His beloved Son. The cross work of Jesus should break our hearts, humble our hearts, and reassure our hearts that Jesus is the Father's only way of salvation for sinners.

This is to show his readers that it is the power of God alone that will spread this gospel to the world and change lives. No human can take any credit from this amazing work of God with a people so prone to failing and sinning. This resurrection power will be seen in their lives in the days ahead, though Mark ends on a sad note.
