Community Group Purpose Statement

What is a Community Group?

Community groups are small gatherings of people that meet regularly for friendship, accountability, study and prayer, laughter, and occasionally tears. Community groups are an essential expression of the mission of Living Hope Baptist Church. They're a place where we learn more about Jesus and life together. They're the place where we wrestle with the truths of the Bible and encourage one another toward the life that God intends for us.

Each community group is unique, shaped by its neighborhood and the people who attend. However, you can expect a weekly gathering in a residence that involves food, conversation, prayer, discussion for applying the Bible to practical living, and service in the neighborhood. At the heart of each community group is the desire to see an authentic community marked by love for Jesus, one another, and the neighborhood.

Why Should I Join a Community Group?

The God of the Bible is a Trinitarian God who is one and three persons: Father, Son, and Spirit. God has made us in his image, which means we are made for community and friendship. And when we are not living in community we suffer because life in a sinful world is too complex and tempting to journey alone. Therefore, community groups are a place where we can live in relationship with one another through the ups and downs of life.



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THE BOOK OF JAMES INTRODUCTION

James is considered to be the first epistle written in the New Testament. James, the half-brother of Jesus, wrote his epistle to the Jewish Christians scattered throughout the pagan world. It is clear to see that James was heavily influenced by the teachings of Jesus. James expresses similar themes in his own unique way that draw the reader back to the Savior, or to the Savior for the first time.

Douglas J. Moo gives these three characteristics to help summarize James approach to his letter:

- James is intensely practical
- James is concise in his teaching
- James uses many metaphors and illustrations that make his teaching easy to understand and to remember.

James goal is to promote a life consistent with faith in Christ the Lord. Even at this early stage in the life of the church, James sensed a need to call people to genuine faith. While many who read his letter were genuine believers, it is sure that many were not, or many who thought they were but were not. Because of this, James brings out the gospel of grace within his letter. The gospel of grace gives birth through the word and the gospel of grace continues to enable genuine believers to live a real faith in a rebellious world even as they see themselves falling short time and time again.

As we look into the mirror of God's Word through this in depth study of the Letter of James, may each of us see ourselves as God sees us, embrace the truth that we hear, and humble ourselves before the Lord as we seek a real faith in a rebellious world.

Chapter 1 Read James 1:1-12

I James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ, To the twelve tribes in the Dispersion:

Greetings.

- **2** Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, **3** for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. **4** And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing.
- 5 If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given him. 6 But let him ask in faith, with no doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea that is driven and tossed by the wind. 7 For that person must not suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord; 8 he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways.
- 9 Let the lowly brother boast in his exaltation, **10** and the rich in his humiliation, because like a flower of the grass he will pass away. **11** For the sun rises with its scorching heat and withers the grass; its flower falls, and its beauty perishes. So also will the rich man fade away in the midst of his pursuits. **12** Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him.

5. What do you think is the most common question asked when facing a severe trial? Why is this so?
6. Instead of praying, "Lord get me out of this", how does the text direct us to pray? Why does James direct us to pray this way?

7. What is God's goal for the trials you face? What is it that keeps you from arriving at that goal?

Chapter 2 Read James 1:12-18

12 Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him. 13 Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. 14 But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. 15 Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.

16 Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. 17 Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change 18 Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of first fruits of his creatures.

3. What two things are required in order to receive the crown of life? (Note: The crown of life is not a literal crown but rather a symbol of eternal life itself)

Chapter 3 Read James 1:19-25

19 Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger;20 for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God. 21 Therefore put away all filthiness and rampant wickedness and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls.

22 But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. 23 For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who looks intently at his natural face in a mirror. 24 For he looks at himself and goes away and at once forgets what he was like. 25 But the one who looks into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer who forgets but a doer who acts, he will be blessed in his doing.

QUESTIONS:

I. How does anger make it difficult to get along with others and to even get along with God?
2. What does the text say is our weapon against the abundance of wickedness that constantly fights against us for victory and dominance?

NOTE: The saving work of the Word (1:21) extends far beyond the day of salvation. In the New Testament, salvation has three aspects:

- Salvation is a past event, for Christ accomplished our salvation in the past. We receive that salvation the day we believe (Luke 19:9; Acts 4:12; 2 Cor. 6:2; Titus 3:5)
- Salvation is a future event, because our deliverance is never complete

until Christ returns, judges men and angels, sends evildoers away from His presence, and restores the heavens and the earth (Matt. 25:31; Rom. 5:9-10; Heb.9:28; I Peter I:5)

- Salvation is a present reality, something we seize and work out day by day (Phil. 2:12)
- James knows salvation is past, present, and future, but his concern in our text is the present. (James, Daniel M. Doriani, p.49)

Chapter 4 Read James 1:26-2:7

26 If anyone thinks he is religious and does not bridle his tongue but deceives his heart, this person's religion is worthless. 27 Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world. I My brothers,[a] show no partiality as you hold the faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the Lord of glory. 2 For if a man wearing a gold ring and fine clothing comes into your assembly, and a poor man in shabby clothing also comes in, 3 and if you pay attention to the one who wears the fine clothing and say, "You sit here in a good place," while you say to the poor man, "You stand over there," or, "Sit down at my feet," 4 have you not then made distinctions among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts? 5 Listen, my beloved brothers, has not God chosen those who are poor in the world to be rich in faith and heirs of the kingdom, which he has promised to those who love him? 6 But you have dishonored the poor man. Are not the rich the ones who oppress you, and the ones who drag you into court? 7 Are they not the ones who blaspheme the honorable name by which you were called?

2. If a person has no concern whatsoever of controlling their tongue in a way that pleases God, what does James say that person is doing to himself and how does James classify that person's religion?

^{3.} How is showing mercy to the poor and defenseless members of society being like God? (See Deut. 10:17-19)

4. What emphasis do you think James has in mind when he says to keep yourself from being corrupted by the world? 5. How does showing favoritism violate the elements of true religion that we saw earlier? 6. In what ways do you show favoritism? It would be easy to answer quickly but give it some thought in all the areas of your life and you may be surprised. **RESPONSE:** In what way did God specifically speak to your heart in this passage?

Chapter 5 Read James 2:8-13

8 If you really fulfill the royal law according to the Scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing well. 9 But if you show partiality, you are committing sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. 10 For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. 11 For he who said, "Do not commit adultery," also said, "Do not murder." If you do not commit adultery but do murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. 12 So speak and so act as those who are to be judged under the law of liberty. 13 For judgment is without mercy to one who has shown no mercy. Mercy triumphs over judgment.

I. As you read Jesus summary of the law in Mark 12:30,31, how does that "royal law" forbid favoritism?

Chapter 6 Read James 2:14-19

14 What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? 15 If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, 16 and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? 17 So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. 18 But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works." Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. 19 You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder!

Chapter 7 Read James 2:20-26

20 Do you want to be shown, you foolish person, that faith apart from works is useless? 21 Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered up his son Isaac on the altar? 22 You see that faith was active along with his works, and faith was completed by his works; 23 and the Scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness"—and he was called a friend of God. 24 You see that a person is justified by works and not by faith alone. 25 And in the same way was not also Rahab the prostitute justified by works when she received the messengers and sent them out by another way? 26 For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, so also faith apart from works is dead.

Chapter 8 Read James 3:1-12

I Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. 2 For we all stumble in many ways. And if anyone does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man, able also to bridle his whole body. 3 If we put bits into the mouths of horses so that they obey us, we guide their whole bodies as well. 4 Look at the ships also: though they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. 5 So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great things. How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire! 6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the entire course of life, and set on fire by hell. 7 For every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by mankind, 8 but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. 9 With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. 10 From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so. II Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and salt water? 12 Can a fig tree, my brothers, bear olives, or a grapevine produce figs? Neither can a salt pond yield fresh water.

You do not have, because you do not ask. **3 You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on your passions. **4 You adulterous people! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand. 9 Do not grumble against one another, brothers, so that you may not be judged; behold, the Judge is standing at the door. 10 As an example of suffering and patience, brothers, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord. 11 Behold, we consider those blessed who remained steadfast.
