What is a Community Group?

They're the place where we wrestle with the truths of the Bible and encourage one another toward the life that God intends for us.

Each community group is unique, shaped by its neighborhood and the people who attend. However, you can expect a weekly gathering in a residence that involves food, conversation, prayer, discussion for applying the Bible to practical living, and service in the neighborhood. At the heart of each community group is the desire to see an authentic community marked by love for Jesus, one another, and the neighborhood.

Why Should I Join a Community Group?

The God of the Bible is a Trinitarian God who is one and three persons: Father, Son, and Spirit. God has made us in his image, which means we are made for community and friendship. And when we are not living in community we suffer because life in a sinful world is too complex and tempting to journey alone. Therefore, community groups are a place where we can live in relationship with one another through the ups and downs of life.

Summary

One image in the Bible that vividly portrays God and His people comes from the life of a potter and his use of the clay. The making of pottery begins with the potter choosing clay that is suitable. The potter examines the clay and makes his choice based on the good and acceptable qualities of the clay. God, as the Master Potter, also chooses the clay, but He chooses clay that is unsuitable and not based on any acceptable qualities the clay possesses. In week one we will examine this amazing truth of God rescuing clay that is unsuitable and unfit – clay that any other potter would bypass and ignore.



Week 2

(selected scriptures)

<u>Summary</u>

When the potter chooses the clay, the work is yet to be done. Before him sits this clump of clay that has no design and no purposeful shape. The potter sees in his mind the design he wishes to build. He removes anything from the clay that will make it harder to work with. He adds water to make it moldable. He sets it on the potter's wheel and as it begins to spin he takes his hands and plunges his wet thumbs into the middle of the unshaped clay. He works his fingers in certain ways to bring the clay to the desired shape that first began in his mind.

In a very similar way, God, having formed us and redeemed us, now sees us as a clump that needs shaped into the design that is in His mind. He removes what should not belong and He thrusts in his loving hands to begin to shape us into the image of His dear Son. This week we examine how God's great desire is to mold His clay to His specific design and the clay's willingness to be molded.


1. If the Potter uses His Word as the tool to shape His clay, describe a person who rarely reads and applies the tool in his or her life.

It is possible that this study has brought to your mind an area that God the Potter desires to change. This may include confessing sin and repenting and asking God for His help and His grace to receive His molding and shaping. Never neglect prayer when seeking the Potter's shaping.

Week 3: THE SOVEREIGNTY OF THE POTTER

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Week 3

(selected scriptures)

<u>Summary</u>

A clump of clay can be a very insignificant vessel compared to big world. As clay, it is very easy to become overwhelmed, confused, fearful, and discouraged. With so many people and events and circumstances surrounding us it is easy to think it is all by chance for either good or bad. We have even invented a word we call "luck", to describe good events that maybe shouldn't have happened.

One of the greatest truths for the Potter's clay (you and me) is that the Potter is sovereign. He is in control of it all. There is much of this truth that is beyond our human grasp but not beyond our ability to have faith and believe in God's total control. One of the greatest truths that the clay can learn is that the Potter is in control of all events including nations, people, the weather, evil, and even suffering. One author said it like this; "God's providence is His constant care for and His absolute rule over all His creation for His own glory and the good of His people." This lesson will examine the sovereignty of the Potter.

Application

1. Read Genesis 45:5 and 50:20. Joseph had a great understanding of the sovereignty of God even after experiencing great trials and hardships. Can you see a place in your life where you need to adjust your perspective to match Joseph's? Take a few moments to examine your life and your responses to life (worry, fear, discouragement, dismay, panic, unsettled, etc..) and write out a brief description of your life and where you struggle and need to embrace God's sovereign control. Even more than Joseph's example we need to look at the example of Jesus. He came and was perfect and suffered greatly but He knew why He came and He knew His Father's sovereign plan.

<u>Prayer</u>

A prayer of thanksgiving for God's great control in your life is a great way to praise Him. Also, confess any sin of your lack of faith which is displayed by worry and anxiety. Ask God for His great help in trusting His sovereignty. (Always remember that we are to obey His word and believe His control over all things for His glory and our good – even though we should still ask for grace and help in the time of need)

Week 4: SEEKING THE POTTER



The Potter and the Clay

<u>Week 4</u> (selected scriptures)

<u>Summary</u>

When the potter takes his clump of clay and begins to work with it pressing his hands deep into it to mold and shape it, the clay never says a word, never complains, and never cries. However, for human clay, it is a different story. Often when the thumbs are placed deep into our lives we complain, cry, and put up a fight. It is a constant battle for the clay to defeat the desires of sin and self and to seek the Potter with his heart, soul, mind and strength. In this lesson we will examine what it looks like for the clay to seek the Potter.

Observation

It is probably a rare thing for us today to have an idol statue in the back yard or in a shrine in our living rooms, but can you think of any other idols of the heart that we have that steal away our seeking of the Potter? Remember, an idol is something that takes the place of God and to us it is of great importance and we worship it with our time, money, effort, and care.

Just begin with one – be careful that you don't list so many things that you are defeated before you start. I major change in a year's time is better than none at all.

<u>Prayer</u>

Confession of sin as related to your idols may be in order here. Also, be specific and ask God to give you wisdom and open your eyes to those things you need to adjust or eliminate in order that you may seek Him better. In your prayer do not forget that the Potter is your Father and you are seeking the One you love. Do not neglect the relationship you have with him. If you do this it will turn into a job rather than a labor of love for you Savior.

Week 5: **THE SEAT OF THE POTTER**

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<u>Week 5</u> (selected scriptures)

<u>Summary</u>

The finished piece of pottery is many times put on a shelf for display in order to be sold. People pass by and view the pottery and make a judgment on it. This week we are going to examine the seat of the Potter, or the judgment of the Potter. The Potter is the only one with the authority to judge because the clay is His possession. The clay is either his possession as being redeemed or his possession as a result of being a part of His creation. We will see that there is a separate judgment for both groups of clay. One results in reward or loss of reward yet saved eternally, while the other results in eternal fire and judgment.


